Shereilla Hearn is one of two YWCA **Resolve Counselors** who ensures that victims and survivors

can learn positive coping skills and find productive ways to work through trauma.

"When asked to be a model for GNO 2024 I felt incredibly honored," said Katie. "The opportunity felt like a gift

and a full-circle moment for the past year of my life. To represent the YWCA and GNO in such a way feels like a dream."

"Wow, what an honor!" said Debbie James. "The YWCA supports, recognizes and celebrates a diverse community of women, not only those in need but also those in a position to help. When you see the faces of GNO, you see emanating from behind the clothes and makeup, women who care about their sisters in need."

We asked our models what attracted them to the work Resolve does. Shereilla shared her perspective as a person of color, "Many of us are familiar with the phrase, 'What happens in this house, stays in this house.' It is a phrase I heard often as a child. It is a phrase that has been repetitively used in Black households for more

years than I've been alive. It is my belief that [that] phrase has been damaging to the Black community as a whole and has fostered and promoted various forms of abusive behaviors in Black households across the country. The commonly used phrase has protected abusers and encouraged silence from victims of abuse for far too long. The phrase has not single handedly created abusive environments in Black households, but it has been a significant factor in the cycle of abuse in Black households. It is a phrase that should never be used in any household or community regardless of race or cultural background. In my position as counselor, I hope to educate the community on the power of words and their impact on families," said Shereilla

Marsha added that, to her, "Resolve stands for everything that I believe when it comes to helping women, children, and families who are experiencing the ravages incurred by sometimes several generations of abusive dynamics, alcoholism, drug use, and mental illness."

"I was attracted first and foremost by the mission," said Katie, "but also because I think my life could have looked differently had I known about the support and resources available through the Resolve program earlier in my life."

Everyone at YWCA Charleston looks forward to GNO and we asked our models what the one thing was they wish someone who had not been to a Girls Night Out knew. Debbie says, "I wish that every woman attending Girls Night Out knew or had heard at least one of the heart-wrenching testimonies shared by survivors."

Katie looks forward to a night of fun. "I wish everyone knew how stinkin' fun it is! How carefree it is! How it is a night to channel all the girl power in your heart and soul and let it out on a dance floor entirely surrounded by other strong and amazing women!"

Shereilla hopes more women join her at the event this year. "GNO is a great night for women of all ages and backgrounds to come together and celebrate the beauty of being a woman." she said. " We all have a story to tell, even if no one has ever heard it. We stand in solidarity with our presence."
